HEALTH CARE ACCESS

Through our referral and case management services, we directly advocate for clients to get the health care they need, provide language support and teach English to ensure quality communication with health care providers, connect clients to resources, assist in making medical appointments, and ensure wraparound services.

HEALTHY LIVES

With changing diets, lifestyles, and stress levels, immigrants have high occurances of diabetes and other diseases. We promote health and wellness through our services:

EMOTIONAL HEALTH

When clients requested programs to support emotional health, El Zócalo developed peer-based, culturally-informed support groups and life coaching. Our support groups and coaching services address the intersections of immigration and emotional needs.

Common experiences that impact immigrant mental health:

Pre-migration: 'push' factors, poverty, violence, natural disasters

Migration: Difficulties with the migration process, experiences with immigration detention

Post-migration: stressors from navigating a new society, learning a foreign language, home sickness for loved ones and community, poverty, neighborhood crime, economic instability, continued fear of the immigration system

FOOD SECURITY

Our services provide clients and their families with food security and our classes empower them to establish and maintain a healthy diet.





FOOD PANTRY

Our food pantry provides nutritious groceries to families as they work to rebuild their lives in a new country with many barriers. Isidro is a client and a volunteer who packages food for families in need.

COOKING CLASSES

Our classes introduce participants to new foods found in this country and provide support in planning and preparing quick, cheap, and healthy meals as they adjust to a new lifestyle.

EDUCATION

Courses offered to clients encompass all of El Zócalo's key goals: health literacy, financial literacy, parent and family literacy, English language acquisition, and civics.



El Zócalo's ESL classes take place in Little Rock and the underserved community of Jacksonville, Arkansas. The classes are layered with practical skills-building for life in the United States, and feature role play and conversation practice, reading and writing exercises with real-life materials, and information on U.S. systems and local resources.

ENGLISH AND SKILLS FOR LIFE

Classes offered multiple times a week teach relevant language and life skills for the whole family, helping immigrants connect and integrate with their communities. "I am grateful for the opportunity to learn English and my children motivate me to continue" -Esmeralda



FAMILY LITERACY

Courses use creative and culturally aware teaching tools to support parents' efforts to navigate the school system and support learning at home as partners in their children's education.



CIVICS

Students are informed of the local, state, and national political systems, laws, and history necessary to interact with systems of government.

PROTECTIONS FOR FAMILIES IN CASE OF DEPORTATION

Fear is a part of life for many families we serve. We offer a family preparedness planning program that helps clients create a detailed plan to prevent them from losing their children, homes and belongings in case of an immigration emergency.



VENTANILLA

A 'window' or station staffed by El Zócalo at the Mexican Consulate and in collaboration with many partners in the financial services community. The Ventanilla provides informational presentations, courses, and individual consultations. Our program travels across Arkansas to spread financial literacy to clients based outside of Little Rock.

FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT

Poverty is often an impetus for our clients to leave their countries, and a continuous struggle upon immigrating. We work closely with our clients to determine both short and long term financial goals, and provide support and education to reach those goals.

FINANCIAL LITERACY

Individualized advocacy, coaching, and education provide families with support to gain financial stability and assistance navigating complex, and often unjust, financial systems and circumstances. Our program focuses on budgeting, banking, saving, credit, and large purchases, such as vehicle and home ownership.



BUILDING BRIDGES

Connecting and collaborating with local nonprofits, businesses, advocates, and caring individuals continues to expand our community support network. Through events and education initiatives, we achieve impact at the community and societal levels.



ENGAGING THE WIDER COMMUNITY

El Zócalo promotes cultural understanding between immigrants and receiving communities through educational efforts and events.



EVENTS

This year, we hosted Tacos and Tianguis, Posada, King's Day and a photography exhibit.

NUMBERS

Generous support and our resourcefulness, strategic planning, and continual evaluation enable us to achieve sustainable impact in our clients' lives.

5000

immigrants were connected with services and information.

100

individuals received civic education and assistance in developing emergency preparedness plans.

400

hours of ESL and life skills classes provided our clients with vital tools to thrive in our community.

3000

people received financial education and coaching, gaining financial stability and moving towards prosperity.

500

people in poverty were assisted with basic needs, like food, clothing, and nutrition classes.



FINANCIALS

In 2018, our total revenue was \$78,389. Our total expenses were \$78,270.

Last year, over 1,000 clients and families participated in our comprehensive model, and our total reach touched 5,000 lives. The work of dedicated interns and volunteers supplement our budget, which covers:
